MMGA Meeting Minutes

Monday, November 6th, 2023 Submitted by Secretary Georgiana (Jana) Gooch.

Members present: Todd Weaver, Jenny Weaver, Pearl Weaver, Kevin Johnson, Ken Blaylock, Deb Blaylock, Cathy Crew, Georgiana Gooch, Greg Kalal, Craig Lisonbee.

Meeting opened at 7:08 pm

Kevin Johnson affirmed we have a quorum established.

Kevin Johnson reviewed the positions on the board that are filled and being vacated and asked for anyone who wants to run for the board to make it known. Jenny Weaver has volunteered to be VP since Lois Rockcastle has indicated she would like to step down. It was motioned by Ken Blaylock that all board members who are currently in place will be serving another term and that Jenny Weaver be accepted as the incoming VP. Deb Blaylock seconded the motion. The motion passed.

We reviewed the standing rules. Deb Blaylock mentioned that we are changing the deadline for membership fees to the first meeting in February. Also, Deb Blaylock motioned that we strike out of the rules the yearly library planting since the library has been demolished. Ken Blaylock seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Deb Blaylock motioned that we only have guest speakers from February through May and that June would be a special project month, to be determined. Ken Blaylock seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Treasurer's report: The Proposed 2024 Annual Budget was presented in the last newsletter.

Discussion ensued regarding discontinuing our current post office box rental and receiving our mail through another route. The current fee for the rental is \$274 as compared to \$250 this past year. Jenny Weaver offered that she would speak with the Experiment Farm about the possibility of having the club's mail go to their address.

We discussed that the projected plant sales for 2024 should be raised to \$15,000. Our budget this year allowed for \$9,000 and we brought in nearly \$14,000.

Also, we discussed that the total operations profit/loss resulted in a profit of \$780 this year (as of the November meeting).

Membership fees paid for the past couple of years were 84 in 2022, 87 in 2023 and, so far, this year we have 20 memberships that have been paid.

Cathy requested that memberships be mailed to one consistent central place. The 2024 Membership Form has Cathy Crew's mailing address on it.

Discussion ensued regarding the association's post office box. Deb Blaylock motioned that we keep the post office box. Ken Blaylock seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Ken Blaylock motioned that we allow \$300 in the new budget for the post office box fees. Craig Lisonbee seconded the motion. Motion carried. The 2024 Budget will be revised from \$250 to \$300 for the post office box.

We discussed the current rate of \$75 for speaker's fees and whether or not we want to drop that amount to \$50. Every year we have eight speakers, which amounts to \$600 a year. Some speakers are generous in that they donate back their fee to the club. Deb Blaylock motioned that we keep the speaker fees at \$75. Craig Lisonbee seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

Ken Blaylock motioned that we accept the revised budget and put it in the newsletter. Craig Lisonbee seconded the motion. Motion carried.

The Winter Gala is next month at Turkey Red, but we will change the meeting date from Monday to Tuesday the 5th of December since Turkey Red is closed on Mondays. Meeting time is 7:00 p.m. Georgiana Gooch volunteered to cook the turkey this year and Deb Blaylock volunteered to cook the ham. The club will reimburse Georgiana and Deb for the cost of the items. We will exchange a white elephant gift that should be under \$25 and wrapped. It was agreed that we would wear crazy sweaters at the gala.

Jenny Weaver questioned why we had a guest speaker talk about biochar. The speaker, Jeff Smeenk, offered his perspective on the use of biochar. It was noted we had a speaker on biochar because it was a topic requested by members.

Jeff Smeenk was our speaker for the evening. Jeff introduced himself as the primary agricultural consultant for the Palmer Soil and Water Conservation District. There are nine districts in total. He is also, among other positions, the consulting agronomist for the Mat-Su and project manager for JBER.

The mission of the Palmer Soil and Water Conservation District is to help "you do it right." They have no regulatory role, so folks should feel free to consult with the organization about their concerns. As Jeff put it, the Palmer Soil and Water Conservation District is the unfunded division of the Department of Natural Resources.

There was a statewide cover crop trial. Planted were 23 species of cover crops in Homer, Kenai, Palmer, Wasilla, Copper Center, Fairbanks, and south of Delta Junction. There was adequate growth which equaled no erosion over the winter.

They have several informational videos on their website:

https://www.palmersoilandwater.org/ and https://www.youtube.com/@aacdvideo6629 They want to make a forest management plan.

They are working on conservation educational projects.

They do agricultural consulting as well as GIS consulting. They are looking at soil moisture monitoring efforts.

They have a project with the Fish and Wildlife Fish Hatching Program.

There is a project on JBER right now for bird air strike hazards (BASH).

They have a project in JBER's drop zone to put in good vegetation that will be set on fire to control the advancing trees (800 acres) and divot repair.

They work with the Knik Tribal Conservation District.

They offer soil testing to landowners at \$25 per sample.

They do the community harvest at the State Fair.

And, finally, there is a lot of contract work that Palmer Soil and Water is involved in.

After the speaker's presentation, the meeting continued. Cathy Crew requested that we move \$3,000 to savings. Discussion ensued. There will be some research done regarding utilizing CDs in order to earn more money for the club.

Also, Kevin Johnson mentioned that it is our turn to host the annual master gardener conference in 2025 and that will cost the club. Several members pointed out that we had agreed to be in a biennial rotation where the conference is held every other year. This had been agreed upon about 4 years ago by the three major Master Gardener clubs - Anchorage, Fairbanks and Mat-Su.

Georgiana Gooch motioned that the meeting be adjourned. Ken Blaylock seconded the motion. Motion passed. The meeting adjourned at 8:39 p.m.

Fresh Cranberry Relish Bonnie Hager

- 1 bag of fresh cranberries (1 lb.)
- 1 whole orange
- Honey to taste

Cut orange into 1/8's, peel and all put in Cuisinart. Pulse a bit and add rinsed cranberries. Continue to pulse until fine. Add honey to taste (about 1/4 cup.). If you have a large bag of cranberries use 2 oranges.

Best if it sits overnight.

Pepper Gingersnaps Deb Blaylock

- 1 ½ C butter, softened
- 2 C white sugar
- 2 eggs
- ¹/₂ C unsulfured molasses
- 4 C flour
- 4 teaspoons baking soda
- 4 teaspoons cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons ground black pepper (or more) (I like the coarse ground black pepper)

Mix all ingredients together.

Roll into 1-inch balls.

Roll balls in white sugar.

Place on cookie sheet and bake at 350° for 10 - 12 minutes.

Makes 6 dozen.

Bourbon Apple Butter - Best I've Ever Had! Connie Zellweger

Ingredients

- 5 pounds any sweet apple, peeled, cored, and diced small (1/4-inch dice)
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 cup good quality Kentucky Bourbon (we used Jim Beam)
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1/2 cup apple liquor (this is our favorite brand) or apple juice
- 2 tablespoons molasses
- 2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon allspice
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Yield: 4 cups

INSTRUCTIONS

Coat apples with lemon juice as you cut and place in a medium to large nonstick pot.

Add bourbon and water and bring to a boil, cover and cook on a low boil for 10 minutes.

Add brown sugar, apple liquor, molasses, cinnamon, allspice, nutmeg, cloves, and salt.

Cover, bring to a boil, lower to a simmer with cover offside letting a little steam escape.

Cook for 30 minutes, stirring often towards the last five to ten minutes as the liquid evaporates.

Puree in a blender or with an immersion blender until creamy.

Can using the water bath method.

Christmas Cheese Ball Marge Mueller

- 1 8 oz cream cheese, softened
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 green onions, chopped
- 1 jar (2 oz) diced pimientos, chopped
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

Beat cream cheese until fluffy. Beat in cheese, onions, pimentos, butter, Worcestershire sauce. Press into a ball and refrigerate; Remove 15 minutes before serving. Serve with assorted crackers.

Brandy Slush Sue Glenn

- 12 oz frozen can of orange juice and lemonade thawed
- 7 cups water
- 1 cup sugar (optional I rarely add any)
- 1 1/2 to 2 cups brandy
- 4 tea bags steeped in 1 cup water for about 10 mins. Black tea or any other flavor you wish.

Mix well and freeze overnight.

Remove from freezer about one hour prior to planned use so it becomes softer but not a liquid.

Scrape portions into a glass. I usually offer up spoons to make it easier to enjoy.

Flavored tea or even flavored brandy can be used to make it your own special recipe. If thawed to a liquid can be refrozen for later consumption. Different amounts of brandy will affect thawing time.

Recipe is easily doubled, tripled etc. A larger recipe may need more time to become slushy.

Sue Wallin Holiday Wassail

This is an aromatic cup of cheer! Recipe from my husband's Godmother.

Tie these spices in a small cheesecloth bag:

- Two two-inch sticks of cinnamon.
- 1 teaspoon whole cloves.
- 2 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice.
- 11/4 teaspoon nutmeg

In a large kettle place:

- 1 six ounce can frozen orange juice concentrate, diluted
- 5 quarts. apple cider
- Juice of five lemons (I use Santa Cruz or Lakewood organic lemon juice) Ratio on label says 2 Tablespoons = one lemon)
- Add some pineapple juice.

Low simmer 15 minutes. Remove spices, serve hot. I like to let it simmer in a crockpot and spice the air.

Roasted Spiced Nuts

Spray PAM in a crockpot. Place one cup each of your three or four favorite nuts. Mix to homogenize. Drizzle with 2T Maple syrup. Toss to coat.

Sprinkle spices over nuts.

- 1 teaspoon curry,
- 1 teaspoon. rosemary,
- ¹/₄ teaspoon cayenne pepper,
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

Cover and cook on High, stirring every 20 min. Keep a tally each time stirred. 80-100 min total. Caution: pecans toast much faster, add later.

Walnuts, almonds, hazelnuts, Brazil nuts, macadamia nuts - all work great!

Spread out on wax paper to cool. Place in a large jar, cover tightly. Enjoy within 2 weeks.

Your submissions are appreciated and make our newsletter what it is - so do not be shy about submitting items for publication.


However, there are a few rules which we all must pay attention to:
