PEASANT'S PERSPECTIVE: BY CURT MUELLER, MASTER GARDENER

When the days begin to get longer, the winter begins to get stronger. This old saying may not always hold true, but it seems to be accurate on this January 19th. The peasant has just retrieved from storage some pots to be sterilized for transplanting tomato seedlings and to bring in a bale of Sunshine Mix to thaw out for the same purpose. It's -20 F and the sun made it over the mountains to the south at 10:30 a.m. We're gaining daylight and the snow and temperature certainly indicate that this is a winter day. So be it.

The peasant is checking out his seed inventory and perusing seed offerings in catalogs and online to see what's new and what old favorites need to be ordered for the approaching growing season. February is a month for starting some flower and vegetable varieties that require considerable time to develop before transplanting to the garden. Over the years, Marge and the peasant have kept track of starting dates with the help of a comprehensive list from Harris-Moran which gives seed to transplant time, germination and growing temperatures, light or dark to germinate, and other useful information. All of this for vegetables and flowers, annual and perennial. The peasant will make some copies and bring to the February master gardener meeting for folks to help themselves to.

The peasant has some favorites for the vegetable garden. Ailsa Craig onions get to be a large size and store well. They are still in fine shape now. He also grows Patterson and Redwing which will store until a new crop is ready. Utah 52-70 is an old standby for celery. Parel hybrid is a favorite for very early cabbage. February is too early for starting cabbage unless you're trying to grow a giant one for the fair. The peasant likes Kabocha type squash for winter squash. Cha-Cha and Winter Sweet are very tasty. There are not so many choices for annual artichokes, but Imperial Star is reliable.

We are fortunate in having so many choices in flowers and vegetables available. Many of the old favorites continue to do very well and new hybrid varieties also. A beef the peasant has with some seed companies is that they'll come out with a new variety that does extremely well and then suddenly it's no longer available. There will be a replacement that will require a trial and it may not do as well. Johnny's is noted for that, but they do have a tremendous selection. Denali Seeds carries many varieties that fit Alaska's growing season. Pine Tree, Territorial, Stark, Park, Burpee, Veseys, Stokes, and more, are good suppliers, online or by mail order or call-in. The peasant likes Stark for high quality strawberry plants. Sharing an order with a couple of friends reduces the cost per bundle and shipping too. A ship date may be requested.

Growing vegetables is the peasant's forte, and he certainly encourages everyone to do more of it. For our own health and the flavor and freshness of the product, our home gardens are without equal.

Your submissions are greatly appreciated and make our newsletter what it is - so don't be shy about submitting items for publication.


However, there are a few rules which we all must pay attention to:
