PEASANT'S PERSPECTIVE:

Some years ago, the peasant got a call from Dr. Steve Brown asking if he would have a look at a gardener's raspberry patch. The raspberry plants were not doing well, and the gardener wanted someone to assess what the problem was. Dr. Brown had other commitments and thought maybe an MG could figure it out.

Address in hand, the peasant found the place and was escorted across the gardeners weedfree lawn and past a bare chokecherry tree to the garden area.

The raspberry plants were in a single row starting a few feet from the lawn and running back forty feet or so at a right angle to the lawn. The plants closest to the lawn were extremely stunted and only about six inches tall. As the row progressed the plants became progressively taller but were still stunted. There would be no crop. The question, which you have probably already anticipated, was "Do you use weed-and-feed on your lawn?" The answer was in the affirmative, and the peasant tried to explain that it was the probable cause for the damage to the raspberry plants.

Calling Dr. Steve later to give him a report, he said "Good observation." He explained that raspberry plants are very susceptible to damage from broadleaf weed killers.

The weed-free lawn had cost the gardener a small tree and his raspberry crop. The use of chemical weedkillers is risky at best. For beekeepers, dandelions and clover are a source of pollen and nectar and are tolerated as such. Clover is a legume and can supply some nitrogen to the lawn. Bees are in a decline for several reasons, the use of insecticides being one of them. Go easy on the chemicals.

12-4 pm workday on Saturday, July 22nd

On this workday, the plan is to:

- 1.) Move the arbor to center it in the front of the lot, then plant kiwi vines on it.
- 2.) Construct a castle block raised bed in one of the plot's corners.
- 3.) Figure out what is going on with the handicap accessible raised beds; possibly set them up.
- 4.) Deliberate about and mark out where and if we want to put other future projects, e.g., perennial beds, hedge/shrub line/fence, educational plaque.


12-4 pm workday on Saturday, August 5th

Minutes of the June 12, 2023, Mat Su Master Gardener's Meeting Submitted by Member Dorte Mobley

Meeting was called to order at 7:05 pm by President Kevin Johnson

Present were Kevin Johnson, Ken and Deb Blaylock, Kristina Tornqvist, Theresa Phillips, Sue Glenn, Cathy Crew, Eva Brown, Isaac Vaughan, Sandy Bohling, Ann Eagerton, Todd Weaver, Pearl Weaver, David Thompson, Dorte Mobley. Having over 10 members constitutes a quorum.

Treasurer's report was presented by Cathy and approved (motion by Ken, seconded by Kristina). We have \$ 8,530.80 available in checking and 7,762.90 in savings. She brought checks and yellow labels for sellers.

The plant sale went well, and we took in \$13,665. \$10,991,20 went back to the members for their share.

There were no minutes from the last meeting.

Kevin informed us that he has reserved the pavilion for 2024,2025 and 2026 for the plant sales.

Some discussion was had on invasive plants sold at the plant sale and that we need to make some decisions before next year regarding how we inform members what they should not sell.

Label counting went well even though Dorte forgot to get names of the people that signed up to Kristina so they could help. 27,000 labels were counted and thanks to Cathy's extra checking all members were paid the right amount (she found a mistake). Kristina informed us that only 13 members sold items at the sale, and that it would be nice to have more members participate.

Cathy suggested that we let some food truck owners know they are welcome to "share our space" without us guaranteeing them a certain amount of money.

David suggested we have a "membership table" with information on how to sign up to be a member and Todd suggested having a list of the plants you are selling at your "table" (especially vegetables and herbs). Kristina added that sellers should go around and see what everyone else is selling so they can help the buyers find stuff and that having pictures of flowers with plants that aren't flowering yet also helps sell your plants.

We still have some open slots open for helping with the Midsummer Garden and Art Faire. We still need to find speakers for little talks and if anyone has ideas for activities we can do with kids and wonderful childish adults. Jenny Weaver has suggested doing a seed recognition "game."

Pioneer Home planting went well and about 12 members helped. We had enough plants for the three beds, but we also had enough to plant 5 planters.

Isaac informed us the Rebarchek Farm committee will have workdays July 15 (Isaac changed the date after the meeting to the 22 due to a schedule conflict) and August 5 from 12-4 both days. The arbor will be moved to the center of our plot, and we will try to define new corners and produce a plan for the future. Isaac is looking for a male Kiwi plant and it was suggested to buy it from Jim Tapley. Theresa mentioned that she could help with getting a soaker hose with a timer on it so plants can be watered automatically. Deb has donated some castle blocks for the making of a raised bed and Isaac will purchase lumber for the bed sides. We still need to consider soil to fill the beds and the beds that Art Nash built on our plot last summer. Isaac suggested making a hedge border. Several members had plants to donate for that.

Eva reported from Dr. Steve Brown: we have 90 new master gardeners in Alaska and 30 each in Fairbanks, Anchorage, and the Valley. They all need to do 40 hours of community service.

It was decided that we would do a garden tour to Anchorage Botanical Garden and also pop-up garden tours. If you want to share your garden with members, or if you talk with a non-member who has a nice or special garden (and they agree to show it just to our members), please send an email to us (<u>matsumastergardeners@gmail.com</u>) and we will spread the word. It can just be for a few hours on a day that is good for you. And if you know of someone in the area that also has a nice garden, please let us know.

Deb informed us that besides the website, we have a Facebook page for sharing events and information as well as two Facebook Groups. Mat-Su Master Gardeners is open to the general public, while Mat-Su Master Gardeners 2023 is for current members only.

Kristina and Dorte dug up the plants at the library and brought them to plant at the farm with the exception of one peony that needs to live in a pot for the summer and get planted in the fall.

Meeting adjourned at 8:15 pm

Your submissions are appreciated and make our newsletter what it is - so do not be shy about submitting items for publication.


However, there are a few rules which we all must pay attention to:
