What happened? Our trees have yet to reach the full glory of fall color and we've already had a touch of the white stuff! Let's hope we don't get a heavy snowfall before our trees lose their foliage and get bowed to the ground with loss of branches or worse. What comes next? Will it be Indian summer or early winter? Time to finish the fall chores, at any rate.

Marge and the peasant got the potatoes harvested on September 20 with the help of a son-in-law who is kind and gives us a hand with many things. Still to harvest at this date are carrots, parsnips, rutabagas, some turnips, and incredibly beautiful late cabbage. These crops can manage some frost, but not freezing soil. Most years we finish the harvest in early October, but the coolness makes us skittish.

Our storage depends on cool temperatures in order for fall harvests to store well. As a consequence, we wait until the frosty nights of early October to finish the harvest. Well, frosty nights are here, so let's get it done. We have a cooling system for our storage bins which uses a fan and a loop of PVC pipe to get the bins cooled down using outside air. At that point gravity takes over and keeps the bins at a low storage temperature. During subzero weather, the pipes can be plugged to stop circulation and prevent freezing temperature in the bins.

One of the potato varieties we like to grow is Fiesta. They continue to bloom and put on size until we get a hard frost, or they have been dug. They have a bicolor which color the skin and also the flesh of the spud. Nordonna, Shepody and German Butterball round out our favorite varieties and give us a wide selection for our winter suppers.

Late storage cabbage can manage some pretty stiff frosts. The variety we are currently growing is Decurion, with a 110-day maturity and very firm heads. A past favorite has been Princeton, but the

seed is no longer available to us. Heads of Princeton are smaller and store very well. The stalks of these late cabbages are long and raises the heads above ground level for some protection from slugs.

Marge and the peasant keep on with the gardening. Fortunately, we get a lot of family help with some of the heavy work, allowing us to continue this satisfying and healthful lifestyle. We contribute transplants and other plants and share our experiences in return for their very generous help.

Thanks folks. Enjoy the benefits of a bountiful harvest.

2022 Mat Su Master Gardener Association Standing Rules

Draft August 2021

Annual review:

The Board shall review these standing rules annually in September for presentation to the membership at the October meeting. The proposed standing rules will be published in the October newsletter for review by group members. The membership will vote on the new standing rules at the November annual meeting.

Amendments:

These Standing Rules may be amended by a majority of members present at a regular meeting after having been presented by the Board.

Dues:

Yearly dues are \$15 for each member or \$20 for a household (more than one member in same household) membership and are payable by December 1 for the following calendar year. If dues are paid by January 15, the member will be listed in the membership directory (if they agree.)

Expenditures:

The Board, at its discretion, can spend up to \$100 per event/activity without vote of the membership for non-budgeted expenses for workshops, projects, and supplies. There shall be maintained in the checking/savings accounts enough monies to fund the yearly budget. Reimbursed expenses are only paid from receipts submitted to the Treasurer within 45 days of expense. Any purchases must be in the approved budget or pre-approved by the Board for up to \$100.

Plant sale:

All Mat-Su Master Gardener Association members who have joined or renewed their membership AND signed up to participate in the plant sale by the May meeting can participate in the plant sale. The Association will provide the members signed up for the plant sale with yellow labels for prices and white labels for plant names at the April and May meetings.

Standing Committees:

Newsletter - The committee shall prepare the monthly newsletter and send it to the web master to post it online and send an email with a link to the web page. This committee will also send out emails and other notices to Association members and interested parties on various club activities and as requested by the Association. Members without email will get a newsletter mailed to them after they provide the Board with their mailing address.

Rebarcheck Farm - The committee will make recommendations and submit plans to the MMGA members for approval and participation.

Parade participation - The committee shall arrange to sign the Association up for parades if requested by the membership, and for a float to be made if so desired. The committee will coordinate work-days and a location to build the float if needed.

Palmer Veterans and Pioneers Home (PVPH) and Palmer Library Planting - The committee shall buy plants in accordance with the Association's budget and arrange for a planting date for the PVPH to be announced to the members. If soil in beds needs amending the committee will arrange for amendments to be donated or purchased. The Association traditionally does the Palmer Library on the first Monday in June. The committee will coordinate a weeding schedule with Association members which will be published in the newsletter and on the website.

Plant Sale - The committee shall:

1. The Board of Directors – usually the President - will arrange for the Palmer Downtown Pavilion a year in advance.
2. Arrange for supplies and advertising.
3. Pick up and hang the Association's plant sale signage on fences around Palmer. Also pick up the large sign to hang up on the Pavilion the day of the plant sale.

4. Provide sign-up sheet for sellers at April and May meetings.
5. Send reminders to members to save boxes for the plant sale.
6. Get table and chairs from the CES office.
7. Oversee operation on the day of sale.
8. Tally yellow plant price labels and assist the Treasurer in tallying cash receipts.
9. Arrange with Treasurer for checks to be written to selling members.
10. Give yellow plant labels back to selling members.

State Fair - The committee shall coordinate with the State Fair Flower and Crops Department Superintendents on which division and class the Association will sponsor for each year's Alaska State Fair. The treasurer will purchase gift cards and deliver them to the Alaska State Fair representative for delivery to winners. The Board decides how much to give for each prize.

There are fourteen prizes: seven first entry winners and seven second entry winners in the following divisions/classes (total \$800 budget estimate):

Summer Garden Tour - The committee shall arrange for garden tour/events that may occur on dates other than monthly meeting dates, announce the dates at the meeting and submit the information for inclusion in the newsletter the month before the event.

Webmaster - The webmaster shall keep the Mat Su Master Gardener web site up to date with Association activities and information. The Planting Committee Chair will provide a summer weeding and watering schedule to the webmaster to post on the website for members to sign up.

Membership Directory - The committee shall compile, format, submit for printing and arrange distributing the annual yearbook to members only.

Scholarship/Grant Committee – The committee will promote the MMGA Scholarship and Grant program, review applications and present qualified applicants to the membership for funding approval.

Midsummer Garden and Art Faire – Coordinate with the Palmer Midsummer Garden and Art Faire committee. Gather volunteers to help set up and take down the booth and man the booth throughout the Faire.

Guest Speakers/Meeting Space Coordinator for September through November and January through May meetings - Coordinate to provide educational presentations for regular meetings. Determine any requirements the speakers may need – i.e., computer or audio-visual equipment. Coordinate with the UAF-CES folks if audio-visual equipment is needed and/or a Zoom meeting. If Zoom meetings are being held, get the Zoom meeting information to the speaker. Coordinate meeting space (if needed) for regular 2022 meetings.

2022 State Master Gardener Conference - The conference chair will establish committees in preparation of the conference. At a minimum, the following committees are needed: Location/venue Coordinator, Vendor Coordinator, Schedule Coordinator, Speaker Coordinator, Advertising Coordinator, Donation Coordinator, Food and Refreshment Coordinator, Audio Visual Equipment Coordinator and any other committees deemed necessary. The committee will establish a conference theme, date and time, location, budget, and fees.

If there are no volunteers to coordinate any committee, the project or committee will not be completed for 2022.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Recipe submitted by Deb Blaylock

This recipe is in honor of my sweet corn crop which didn't have a chance to finish ripening this year. Plus, it's something to use up all the candy corn left over from Halloween.

CANDY CORN SUGAR COOKIES

Ingredients:

- 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of flour
- 1 teaspoon of baking soda
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of baking powder
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of salt
- 1 cup of butter, softened
- 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups of sugar
- 1 egg, room temperature
- 2 teaspoons of vanilla extract
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of candy corn
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of caramel chips

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. In a small bowl whisk flour, baking soda, baking powder, and salt. Set aside.

In a large bowl, cream butter, and sugar, about 4 minutes using a hand mixer. Add egg and vanilla to butter mixture and mix together. Slowly add in flour mixture, reserving 2 tablespoons of flour mixture. Do not over mix.

Toss candy corn and caramel chips with the 2 tablespoons of flour. Add caramel chips to cookie mixture.

To a well-greased pan, add 2 tablespoons of cookie dough for jumbo cookies, or 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons for regular sized cookies. Top with candy corn.

Bake jumbo cookies for 13-15 minutes or until edges become slightly golden brown. Bake regular cookies for 8-10 minutes. Allow to cool fully before serving.

Makes about 12 jumbo cookies and about 24 regular cookies.

Tip: If adding candy corn into the cookie dough, when spooning dough onto the cookie sheet, be sure to either have candy corn within the center of the ball or on top to keep the candy corn from melting onto the sheet.
