At the end of August, a growth spurt took place on the tree. Surely this is going to have an adverse effect when it's time for it to leaf out next spring.

Photo 1. This photo was taken August 29, 2023. It shows a spurt of new growth on the peasant's bur oak. It was likely triggered by a two-week period of good weather at the beginning of August and is not typical. The pale-yellow green is the growth spurt.

Directly below it is the darker green normal growth which ended in June. That ended in a cluster of buds which leafed out and produced a new stem in August but should have remained in the bud stage until spring of 2024. Growing conditions this late in the season will probably not allow the August growth to mature. It will most likely die back to the nearest viable bud on the June growth. All branches on the tree developed the growth spurt. If there is no viable bud on the June growth that will probably die back as well.

Photo two. This photo was taken September 25 of the same branch as in photo one. You can see that it has made some progress in that period of time but not much. It is unlikely to produce any buds this late in the season, so this growth is expected to completely die back on this branch and similar late growth on the rest of the tree. The peasant keeps his hopes up.

Stock or Stalk - They Sound the Same - Butt...

How many of you put celery stocks in your soup? This time of year, many a gardener turned hunter, are out stocking those moosies. (Dastardly devils who ate our gardens this summer) Should we even mention the stalk market?? I think that is a topic none of us want to really think about these days. But - are we using incorrect words (homonyms sound the same, are sometimes spelled the same, or can have different spelling, but have different definitions)?

The correct wording is to use celery <u>stalks</u> in your soup, hunters <u>stalk</u> the moose and investors check the <u>stock</u> market. Maybe we should take <u>stock</u> of the use of the word butt; <u>but</u> is the conjunction (conjunction junction - get that song out of your head) to use - not the noun, <u>butt</u>.

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October Meeting Activity



Photo 3. This photo is to demonstrate how unusual our summer was. These crabapples are half the size of normal, and still not mature. The same is true of other bearing fruit trees. Cool temperatures and overcast skies as the fruits were developing definitely set them back. Also, at the time pollination should have been occurring, cool and rainy weather kept the pollinators away. This tree is losing its leaves now, with abscission being aided by morning frosts. These tiny crabapples are favorites of waxwings, pine grosbeaks and spruce grouse during winter and robins and other birds before migration. Marge and the peasant have more than a dozen of these trees. They were purchased in 1983 from Gurney's seed catalog which advertised hardy apples, 25 for \$11.95. How could anyone resist such an offer? They arrived as tiny six-inch bare root seedlings. All survived. The one in the photo is now a thirtyfooter. All bloom and bear each year, some with white and some with pink flowers. Fruit is held all winter. Yes, they are hardy, but apples? That could be a bit of a stretch.

Meeting opened at 7:02 pm

Ken Blaylock motioned to approve last month's meeting minutes. Motion passed.

Kevin Johnson discussed the disappointing gardening weather we had this summer, then reviewed the events the MMGA was involved in during the past 8-9 months:

~We planted and maintained the flower beds at the Palmer Veterans and Pioneers Home.

~The library was not available this year for any planting/maintaining.

~Rebarchek Farm MMGA Plot was headed by Isaac Vaughan, and he headed up a couple of work dates and work partners.

~The June plant sale was good with excellent attendance of buyers and members. Sales went fast.

~We cleaned up the perennial bed at the Experimental Farm.

~We sponsored special awards at the State Fair.

~We worked with a couple of organizations at the Mid-Summer Flower and Art Faire.

-We took first place in the Agriculture/Animal category with our State Fair parade float.

There was no Vice President's report.

Cathy Crew presented the Treasurer's report. It was a combined three months' worth of reports to include this summer's activities. At the last meeting in June, Cathy gave out information on the plant sale. There is \$7,220.32 in checking and \$7,765.22 in savings. We have not heard from Isaac Vaughan on Rebarchek. We paid the liability insurance for one year. We covered the State Fair prizes. There have been no new memberships for a while now. She requested we consider adding her address on the membership form so the memberships can come directly to her. Ken Blaylock motioned that we accept the Treasurer's Report with a second by Deb Blaylock. Motion passed.

We need to think about the vacancies for committees this year. There is a vacancy for the winter social. In the absence of someone volunteering for the position, Kevin Johnson offered that tomorrow he will reserve the Turkey Red venue for the Winter Social.

Deb Blaylock has a pitch for the October meeting: Let us make this an opportunity to brag about our gardens and provide Deb with pictures and she will prepare a slide show for the October meeting. She asked that everyone bring a small dish to the October meeting that was created from the produce out of our gardens.

Cathy Crew proposed that we move \$3,000 from checking into savings. As a side note, we made \$3,000 on the plant sale. Kevin Johnson will talk with Cathy Crew about it and figure something out and discuss at the next budget meeting next month.

Afterwards, there was a special presentation by Bob Veldhuizen on Soil Sampling and Testing and Interpretation and why it is important.

There was a lot of information given, some highlights were:

Keep in mind that if you change one aspect of your soil's properties, you affect all other aspects of your soil.

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Ideal soil properties: temperature, moisture, bulk density, structure, and texture.

Ideal chemical properties: Is it acid or alkaline, electrical conductivity, cation exchange capacity and macro nutrients (primary and secondary), and micronutrients.

Ideal biological soil properties: organic matter. Ideal environmental properties: weather. Remember that everything to do with soil takes time!

There is a soil sampling brochure available for free from the Cooperative Extension Service at <u>https://cespubs.uaf.edu/</u>.

You can get an interpretation of your soil test results from Bob. It takes time to analyze soil. Alaska has mostly acidic soil. So, it is important to use a laboratory that is familiar with Alaska's soils. Such as: Brookside Laboratories at 200 White Mountain Drive, New Bremen, OH 45869 (419) 977-2766. Fax (419) 977-2767. Website: https://www.blinc.com/ It is about \$20 a sample. Take several areas for sampling.

Learn about gardening and soil in Alaska. Extension Service has a lot of free information. Also, the NRCS website has a free web soil survey (that is the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service). Go to https://www.nrcs.usda.gov/resources/dataand-reports/web-soil-survey

Draft 2024 Mat Su Master Gardener Association Standing Rules Approved by the MMGA Board of Directors: xx Oct 2023

Annual review:

The Board shall review these standing rules annually in September for presentation to the membership at the October meeting. The proposed standing rules will be published in the October newsletter for review by group members. The membership will vote on the new standing rules at the November annual meeting.

Amendments:

These Standing Rules may be amended by a majority of members present at a regular meeting after having been presented by the Board.

Dues:

Yearly dues are \$15 for each member or \$20 for a household (more than one member in same household) membership and are payable by December 1 for the following calendar year. If dues are paid by January 15, the member will be listed in the membership directory (if they agree).

Expenditures:

The Board, at its discretion, can spend up to \$100 per event/activity without vote of the membership for non-budgeted expenses for workshops, projects, and supplies. There shall be maintained in the checking/savings accounts enough monies to fund the yearly budget. Reimbursed expenses are only paid from receipts submitted to the Treasurer within 45 days of expense. Any purchases must be in the approved budget or pre-approved by the Board for up to \$100.

Plant sale:

All Mat-Su Master Gardener Association members who have joined or renewed their membership AND signed up to participate in the plant sale by the May meeting can participate in the plant sale. The Association will provide the members signed up for the plant sale with yellow labels for prices and white labels for plant names at the April and May meetings.

Standing Committees:

Newsletter - The committee shall prepare the monthly newsletter and send it to the webmaster to post it online and send an email with a link to the web page. This committee will also send out emails and other notices to Association members and interested parties on various club activities and as requested by the Association. Members without email will get a newsletter mailed to them after they provide the Board with their mailing address.

Rebarcheck Farm - The committee will make recommendations and submit plans to the MMGA members for approval and participation.

Parade participation - The committee shall arrange to sign the Association up for parades if requested by the membership, and for a float to be made if so desired. The committee will coordinate workdays and a location to build the float if needed.

Palmer Veterans and Pioneers Home (PVPH) and Palmer Library Planting - The committee shall buy plants in accordance with the Association's budget and arrange for a planting date for the PVPH to be announced to the members. If soil in beds needs amending the committee will arrange for amendments to be donated or purchased. The Association traditionally does the Palmer Library planting on the first Monday in June. The committee will coordinate a weeding schedule with Association members which will be published in the newsletter and on the website.

Plant Sale - The committee shall:

1. The Board of Directors – usually the President - will arrange for the Palmer Downtown Pavilion a year in advance.

- 2. Arrange for supplies and advertising.
- 3. Pick up and hang the Association's plant sale signage on fences around Palmer. Also pick up the large sign to hang up on the Pavilion the day of the plant sale.
- 4. Provide sign-up sheet for sellers at the April and May meetings.
- 5. Send reminders to members to save boxes for the plant sale.
- 6. Get the Association's table and chairs from the CES office.
- 7. Oversee operation on the day of sale.
- 8. Tally yellow plant price labels and assist the Treasurer in tallying cash receipts.
- 9. Arrange with Treasurer for checks to be written to selling members.
- 10. Give yellow plant labels back to selling members.

State Fair - The committee shall coordinate with the State Fair Flower and Crops Department Superintendents on which division and class the Association will sponsor for each year's Alaska State Fair. At the conclusion of the Fair, the committee chair will coordinate with the Superintendent to get the winner's name and address for each of the prizes to be awarded. These will be forwarded to the Treasurer who will mail out checks. The Board decides how much to give for each prize.

There are fourteen prizes: seven first entry winners and seven second entry winners in the following divisions/classes (total \$800 budget estimate):

Summer Garden Tour - The committee shall arrange for garden tour/events that may occur on dates other than monthly meeting dates, announce the dates at the meeting and submit the information for inclusion in the newsletter the month before the event.

Webmaster - The webmaster shall keep the Mat Su Master Gardener website up to date with Association activities and information. The Planting Committee Chair will provide a summer weeding and watering schedule to the webmaster to post on the website for members to sign up.

Membership Directory - The committee shall compile, format, submit for printing and arrange distributing the annual yearbook to members only.

Scholarship/Grant Committee – The committee will promote the MMGA Scholarship and Grant program, review applications and present qualified applicants to the membership for funding approval.

Midsummer Garden and Art Faire – Coordinate with the Palmer Midsummer Garden and Art Faire committee. Gather volunteers to help set up and take down the booth and staff the booth throughout the Faire.

Guest Speakers for January through May and September through November meetings - Coordinate to provide educational presentations for regular meetings.

Meeting Space/Equipment/Zoom Coordinator for January through May and September through November meetings - Determine any requirements the speakers may need – i.e., computer or audio-visual equipment. Coordinate with the UAF-CES folks if audio-visual equipment is needed and/or a Zoom meeting. If Zoom meetings are being held, get the Zoom meeting information to the speaker. Coordinate meeting space (if needed) for regular meetings.

If there are no volunteers to coordinate any committee, the project or committee will not be completed for 2024.

However, there are a few rules which we all must pay attention to:


