PEASANT'S PERSPECTIVE: BY CURT MUELLER, MASTER GARDENER

Rabbits around a garden or fruit trees have never been favored by the peasant. Whether they are running loose from the people who raise them or are domestic rabbits that have become feral is a question. At any rate, since they are accustomed to being around buildings and to some extent people, their destructive qualities go beyond being just a nuisance. My good neighbor lost her valuable and much prized apple trees to extreme girdling; they were already beginning to bear. The peasant had sprinkled moth balls around the base of his young apple trees to prevent vole damage, and it seems to have worked for rabbits as well.

This spring the peasant had set his flats of cole plants in the garden area, to be planted when the soil was ready. Indeed, the rabbits got into the transplants and ate all the leaves off some of them. Three rabbits developed a fatal condition brought on by a .17 caliber rifle borrowed from the peasant's son-in-law.

That brings up a more interesting topic. Left in the flats, the leafless plants began to form a new small leaf in a few days. The peasant, always a bit frugal, decided to see if any were salvageable. Two Packman broccoli plants and two Snow Crown cauliflower plants were transplanted to a space where they wouldn't be crowded by other plants. The broccoli never developed a nice central head but did make a few satellite heads. The cauliflower made almost full-sized heads, but it took until mid-August for it to happen. The Snow Crown plants that escaped the rabbits were harvested in early July. While the peasant doesn't recommend the appetites of rabbits to be used as season extenders, perhaps some judicious pruning

by the gardener might delay the harvest for some plants so they don't all mature at once. It might be an interesting experiment.

The peasant wrote earlier about varying maturities among cultivars. Corona cauliflower, a new variety tried by the peasant, held true to its 30-day maturity but was disappointing in its appearance and flavor. The old standby, Snow Crown, produced well at 50-60 days and Callisto much later at 90-105 days produced very large heads of tasty cauliflower. White Amazing, at 68 days, came on at almost the same time as Snow Crown.

There you have it. We live and continue to learn. Thanks, folks.




The photo of this nice head of Snow Crown cauliflower was taken August 8. Its start had been severely damaged by rabbits before transplanting, to the extent that all leaves were eaten off the transplant. The transplant recovered and produced a head six weeks later than the undamaged plants.

However, there are a few rules which we all must pay attention to:


